COMMITTEE INFORMATION

As discussed at meetings in the Spring, the number of formal committees is now four rather than nine. First, the Nominating Committee is elected by the club and the remaining committees are appointed by the club president and authorized by the board. For our club, these committees are:

1. Advocacy 2. Membership 3. Service

These three (3) committees are responsible to meet and plan various activities, events, and programs assigned to each respective committee. Two (2) Co-Chairs serve to coordinate the various duties of each committee and getting all committee members involved. A Board Liaison is available to assist the Co-Chairs as necessary and to keep the Board advised and updated on the plans and progress of the committee.

This realignment naturally put more members on each committee. The intent is that this allows greater flexibility among committee members to serve at various times throughout the year, since we all have times that are busier than others. This realignment should help in balancing our busy lives and the commitments we have as women and Zontians, giving all of us an opportunity to contribute and participate in the varied undertakings of our assigned committees.

Below is a brief summary of the duties for each committee, along with the new committee assignments for the next two (2) years. A full "Committee Descriptions" document will be provided to the Co-Chairs who will share them with their committee members as they plan and/or schedule committee meetings. So, be prepared to hear from your Co-Chairs soon!

<u>ADVOCACY COMMITTEE</u> - The Advocacy Committee is responsible to direct and coordinate the club's advocacy efforts throughout the year. Advocacy is the expression of support for, or opposition to, a cause, argument or proposal. Advocacy actions may include influencing laws, legislation or attitudes. Zonta advocacy is an action taken in "the public interest" or for "the greater good" with respect to empowering women and girls and their human rights. Specific duties include:

September Program

Literacy Opportunities in Clinton County



The program on September 22 was provided by **Maeve Brewer**, Children's Service Manager with Frankfort Community Public Library (FCPL). Maeve shared information on the Library's various literacy programs for both children and adults **AND** on the new affiliation with the Dolly Parton Imagination Library (DPIL)!

Frankfort Community Public Library (FCPL)

Tiny Tikes is for age 0 to 2/3 years, with an adult, where children learn through stories and other activities. **Little Learners**, for age 3 to kindergarten, may incorporate a craft project, along with songs, into the process of getting this group to love learning and reading. Sessions for both groups run about 15-20 minutes each.

Maker Space is for grades 1-5 and is based on STEAM (*Science, Technology, Engineering, the Arts, & Math*). This is an hour long session with hands-on learning and activities.

The Edge for Teens, directed by our own Rachel Milburn, Teen Services Manager for the FCPL, serves Tweens (grades 4-6) and Teens (grades 7-12 / ages 18/19). The Edge provides programs where these kids can learn &/or participate in varied activities, like using a laptop or iPad, playing video or board games. They can also check out a book or game to take home, work on group projects, or just spend time with their friends!

The Clinton County Literacy Program focuses on early literacy learning by reading in the preschool and elementary schools. In addition, volunteer tutors meet one-on-one with adults who need help with reading and writing. Parents and children &/or adults and children learn together. The program offers one-on-one tutoring classes to adults who are learning English as a second language, as well as other opportunities to promote reading in our elementary schools, both through private lessons and community reading days. Dolly Parton Imagination Library (DPIL)

Inspired by her father's inability to read and write Dolly started her Imagination Library in 1995 for children in her home county. Today, her program spans five countries and gifts over 1 million free books each month to children worldwide.

"When I was growing up in the hills of East Tennessee, I knew my dreams would come true. I know there are children in your community with their own dreams. They dream of becoming a doctor or an inventor or a minister. Who knows, maybe there is a little girl whose dream is to be a writer and singer. The seeds of these dreams are often found in books and the seeds you help plant in your community can grow across the world." Dolly Parton

Each month, DPIL mails a high quality, age appropriate book directly to all registered children from 0 to five years. They provide the infrastructure of the program, managing the secure database and coordinating book selections. It also incurs the cost of the program's administrative expenses and coordinates the monthly mailings.

DPIL partners with Local Affiliates/Partners who help bring the program to communities. Along with the FCPL, those helping to bring the DPIL to Clinton County, known here as Local Champions, are the Learning Network of Clinton County, Community Schools of Frankfort Education Foundation, Clinton County Purdue Extension, & St. Matthew Community Preschool. DPIL negotiates wholesale pricing of the books, which are 100% free to enrolled children, as these Local Champions secure funds to cover the cost of the books and the shipping fees which is about \$25 per child per year. To ensure the future of the DPIL in our community, Local Champions hope to establish an endowment.

In Indiana, 52 Local Affiliates are already serving over 57,000 children enrolled in the DPIL from 54 counties. Clinton County now has around 6,000 children under five who could benefit, yet there is an enrollment limit of 3-400 children due to current funding limits.
