Suzanne Leeke, Area 4 Director and member of the Lebanon Club, was our guest at our November 8th meeting. She reviewed steps to access "My Zonta" through zonta.org and recapped events of 2023 to date: NAIDM this Summer, Area 4 Rally & Silent Walk in September, a precursor to Domestic Violence Awareness Month in October and Zonta Says NO! / 16 Days campaign from November 25—December 10, and District 6 Fall Conference in October.

Suzanne referenced the Area 4 Spring Meeting/Workshop that we are hosting on April 20th and shared that our Area is also host for the 2024 District 6 Conference in October, with an exact date to be set later this month.

She also spoke about some ideas for Area-wide events, including a joint fundraiser, Service project, Advocacy project, and Membership drive, asking for thoughts about these or other ideas to be sent to her.

The Service Program on October 25th brought Casey Werner of Werner & Son to share information about their recycling process which goes far beyond Frankfort & Clinton County!

As many of you know, Wednesday is the day the City picks up items for recycle. What you may not know is that your items are transported directly to Werner & Son where their 10-15 employees sort it and separate it by the grade of material, like cardboard, newspapers, and plastic. Plastics are further divided by number: #1— water and soda bottles & #2—milk jugs which can be reused, and laundry soap jugs which, because of their color, can be made into such items as black planters or pots. They also separate unbroken glass and use a magnet to remove steel items, while aluminum items, such as cat food or soda cans, are pulled manually.

In addition to the City, Werner's also accept or collect materials from the Town of Mulberry, Chrysler, 3 locations of Conagra, the Cities of Tipton and Elwood, and from Grant County. Cardboard goes to mills in Eaton and Wabash, Indiana 2-3 times per day, along with another location in southern Michigan. Newspapers and magazines are also taken to Wabash where they can be recycled into drink carriers. Other paper material goes to Wisconsin. Water and soda bottles (#1 plastic) are taken to Richmond, Indiana where they are made into carpet and to Minnesota where Duluth Trading Company uses them in the manufacturing of t-shirts, underwear, and wallets. Type #2 (milk and detergents jugs) is transported to Alabama and other odd plastics to Tennessee. Glass goes to Indy, aluminum is taken to Kokomo, and other metal material is taken across town to Wampler's Disposal Service & Recycling.

Some guestions answered and other information shared:

Q = Do labels need to be removed from cans? A = No.

Q = Do glass jars have to be clean? A = Good enough is good enough!

Q = What can we do to help? A = Fill cardboard boxes with cardboard.

The 3 original Rs... Reduce, Reuse, Recycle

Other Rs... Recover, Refurbish, Refuse, Regift, Remanufacture, Repair, Repurpose, Rethink

Q = Do items from the City recycle stations at the Street Dept. go to Werner's? A = Yes.

Fees: Frankfort is charged for Werner's services, while examples of free pick-ups are Clinton Central and Elwood.

This was a great program, learning about our local recycling process, where items go from here, and what happens once they get there — all pieces to help us know actions we can take to impact our climate in a positive way.

On 25 November, Zonta International commemorates the International Day for the Elimination of Violence Against Women and kicks off the 16 Days of Activism to End Gender-Based Violence (25 November – 10 December) as part of the Zonta Says NO to Violence Against Women campaign.

"Zonta envisions a world where no woman lives in fear of violence. Through the **Zonta Says NO to Violence Against**Women campaign, our members and allies stand together, uniting our voices to bring awareness to this issue" said Zonta International President Ute Scholz. "Zonta is needed now, more than ever, to continue its work to end gender-based violence and build a better world for women and girls."

As Zonta enters its twelfth campaign cycle, the facts behind gender-based violence still exist. According to a World Health Organization (WHO) report, 56% of murders of women worldwide are committed by an intimate partner or close family member. In addition, nearly 30% of women worldwide have been subjected to physical and/or sexual intimate partner violence, non-partner sexual violence, or both at least once in their life.

Together, Zonta International can help eliminate gender-based violence and build a better world for women and girls.
